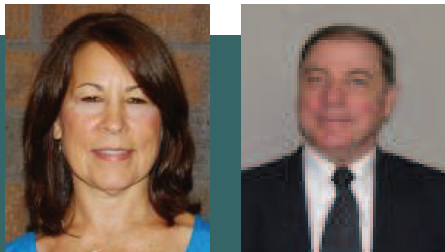

Jennifer Serravallo was a teacher in Title 1 Schools in NYC, and later a Senior Staff Developer at the Teachers College Reading and Writing Project at Columbia University. She is now a national consultant and speaker who helps urban, suburban, and rural schools implement exceptional literacy instruction. She is the author of numerous books on the teaching of reading and writing including the New York Times bestseller, The Reading Strategies Book and the two-time award-winning Independent Reading Assessment series. Her latest book, The Writing Strategies Book, was released in February 2017. Check out her blog at www.jenniferserravallo.com and tweet her @jserravallo.

Differentiated, goal-directed instruction represents the ideal best practice in reading instruction. However, many teachers understandably struggle with making it a reality. Jen will help you understand the steps it takes to lead your school in the direction of true differentiation in reading instruction.

The presentation will begin with some groundwork around research. You'll learn about why goal-setting and feedback are so crucial, and why choosing strategies that are accessible to students is the fastest way toward engagement, independence, and increased skill in literacy.

Jen will then discuss formative assessments and will help you consider the sorts of information that is most helpful for teachers to use when getting to know the nuanced differences of the readers in their classrooms.

Then, Jen will show through various video examples and explanation, different classroom teaching structures for supporting individual goals including conferring and small group instruction.

Throughout the day, you'll learn the look-fors and have practice giving critical feedback to the educators you lead. This highly engaging, interactive workshop will help you feel equipped to have conversations with teachers at your school; observe and support teachers as they practice analyzing formative assessments, goal setting, and teaching individuals and group; as well as critically consider the approaches to literacy in your school.

Michael Fullan, OC, is the former Dean of the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education of the University of Toronto. Recognized as a worldwide authority on educational reform, he advises poli-cymakers and local leaders around the world in helping to achieve the moral purpose of all children learning. Michael Fullan received the Order of Canada in December 2012. He holds honorary doctorates from several universities in North America and abroad.

Michael Fullan is a prolific, award-winning author whose books have been published in many languages. His book Leading in a Culture of Change was awarded the 2002 Book of the Year Award by Learning Forward, Breakthrough (with Peter Hill and Carmel Crévola) won the 2006 Book of the Year Award from the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE), and Turnaround Leadership in Higher Education (with Geoff Scott) won the Bellwether Book Award in 2009. Change Wars (with Andy Hargreaves) was awarded the 2009 Book of the Year Award by Learning Forward and Professional Capital (with Andy Hargreaves) won the AACTE 2013 Book of the Year. Michael Fullan's latest books are: The Principal: Three Keys for Maximizing Impact, and Coherence: Putting the right drivers in action (with Joanne Quinn). He currently serves as an Advisor to the Premier and Minister of Education in Ontario.

Principals are often called the second most crucial in-school influencers (after teachers) of student learning. But what should the principal and other educational leaders do in order to maximize student achievement? One of the best-known leadership authors in education, Michael Fullan will focus on what school and district leaders need in order to have deep impact on teacher and student learning as they link to state policy. Fullan shows how principals have been boxed into a narrow role that undercuts their ability to develop the whole school. He sheds light on how, in times of crisis, it's all too easy for principals to do the wrong thing — to take actions that are ineffective or even counter-productive, particularly when they don't feel entirely in charge. But even in the toughest of external conditions, there is always leeway for action. Fullan

explains how leaders should forgo individualistic solutions in favor of collaborative effort. He shares how principals can foster the professional capital of teachers and get far more accomplished for all students.

Myron Dueck has gained experience over 22 years in both Canada and New Zealand in subjects ranging from grades 4 to 12. Beginning in 2006, Myron developed a number of assessments and grading systems with his classes in which students have greater opportunity to show what they understand, adapt to the feedback they receive and play a significant role in the reporting of that learning. Myron has been a part of district groups, school committees and governmental bodies that have further broadened his access to innovative steps taken by others. Myron has shared his stories, tools and first-hand experiences with public, charter and international school educators from around the world. In recent years Myron's presentations have diverged to include human nature, global trends and social realities. Myron has twice been published in EL Magazine. His best-selling book, [Grading Smarter, Not Harder – Assessment Strategies that Motivate Kids and Help Them Learn](#) was released by ASCD in July 2014 and in 2015 ASCD released a video project from in his own school district entitled 'Smarter Assessment in the Secondary Classroom.'

Let's start with a conversation: 'What do I believe?'

- What is the critical role of an educator today?
- What are the core beliefs that drive my practice?
- What are the classroom experiences that support those beliefs?
- What is the PURPOSE of grading and reporting?

Targets for Learning & Assessment of Targets – Classroom tools that work.

- Myron will provide concrete steps and templates as to how he built a student-monitored retesting system based on student-friendly learning outcomes that support a competency-minded environment.
- Myron will demonstrate how clear project learning targets and alternative assessment routines can not only make assessments both effective and efficient, but also help build positive relationships with some of the most unlikely students.
- This session will underscore the impact these changes have on empowering all learners.

Next Steps – Do assessment changes cause a re-examination of grading rules?

- In this session will tackle the conversation around how to best align grading practices to standards-based assessment.
- Homework strategies and efforts to curb late assignments that uphold assessment data rather than eroding it will be addressed.
- In this session attendees will see numerous examples of grading strategies from across the curriculum that support good behaviors and also maintain the legitimacy of assessment data

Next Steps – District, School or Personal Audit and What is my personal action plan?

- In this segment, attendees will get the opportunity to perform an audit that compares our beliefs to the current state of our schools. This will be an opportunity for leaders to prioritize the next steps intended to further this work in their individual buildings. The main idea in this session will be looking at the resources required to move from existing state to desired state.
